ABSTRACT

The rapid development of social media has transformed communication patterns among young people, particularly Generation Z who grew up in a digital environment. Interaction within virtual spaces not only influences communication practices but also shapes linguistic variations used in everyday digital communication. This study aims to analyze the role of social media and the construction of Generation Z identity in shaping language variation in digital communication. The research employs a descriptive qualitative approach using data derived from posts, comments, and other forms of online communication across social media platforms. Data were analyzed through discourse analysis and identification of language variation patterns. The findings indicate that social media functions as a space for the production of new linguistic forms, including slang, code-mixing, abbreviations, and visual symbols. These linguistic variations serve as tools for identity expression, group solidarity, and markers of social proximity. The study highlights that language change in digital spaces represents not only a linguistic phenomenon but also a reflection of generational identity construction in contemporary digital society.

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1. INTRODUCTION

The development of information and communication technology has brought about fundamental changes in the patterns of social interaction in society. Social media now functions not only as a means of exchanging information but also as a space for the production of new meanings, identities, and linguistic practices. Generation Z, born and raised in a digital ecosystem, has a high level of social media usage intensity, making digital space the primary arena for daily communication [1], [2]. This condition

indicates that digital communication is not simply an extension of conventional communication but has formed a social practice with its own characteristics.

As digital natives, Generation Z utilizes social media not only for information consumption but also for self-expression and social identity formation. Digital content, online interactions, and virtual social networks play a role in shaping how this generation understands themselves and their social environment [3], [4], [5]. In this context, language becomes a crucial instrument in negotiating identity, demonstrating group

membership, and building social closeness. Language practices in digital spaces are often flexible, creative, and adaptive to the rapid dynamics of communication.

This phenomenon is evident in the emergence of various language variations on social media, such as the use of slang, abbreviations, code-mixing, and the use of visual symbols. These language variations not only reflect linguistic creativity but also indicate a shift in language norms among the younger generation [6], [7]. Social media enables the rapid and widespread dissemination of new language forms, allowing language innovation to develop quickly. Thus, the digital space functions as a social laboratory where language undergoes dynamic change.

Several studies have shown that social media use has a significant influence on the language practices of the younger generation. Studies that simultaneously integrate social media, generational identity, and language variation are still relatively limited. Yet, these three aspects are interconnected in shaping complex and contextual digital communication practices.

Based on this background, this study aims to analyze the role of social media and Generation Z identity construction in shaping language variation in digital communication. This research is expected to contribute to the development of digital sociolinguistic studies in Indonesia, particularly in understanding how language develops as a social practice in virtual spaces. Furthermore, the research findings are expected to serve as a reference in formulating strategies to strengthen the use of Bahasa Indonesia amidst the ever-evolving dynamics of digital communication.

2. LITERATURE REVIEW

2.1 *Social Media as a Linguistic Communication Space*

Social media has evolved into a primary communication space in digital society. Digital platforms serve not only as a medium for information exchange but also as an arena for the formation of new linguistic practices. The language used in social media tends to be more flexible, contextual, and influenced by the dynamics of rapid and open online interactions. From a digital linguistics perspective, social media can be understood as a language production space that allows for the emergence of new forms of communication that do not always adhere to conventional linguistic norms [13], [14].

The structure of social media, which allows for concise, visual, and interactive communication, also encourages the emergence of concise and expressive language styles. The characteristics of digital technology influence word choice, sentence structure, and the use of communication symbols such as emojis and abbreviations. Thus,

variations in digital language are influenced not only by linguistic factors but also by the design of the communication technology itself [8], [15]. Furthermore, cross-community interactions on social media enable more intensive language and cultural exchange, accelerating the process of language innovation among young users [6], [16].

Digital interactions involving various cultural influences can lead to shifts in linguistic norms, particularly among the younger generation. The use of mixed languages, foreign terms, and informal forms of language demonstrates that technology plays a role in shaping new communication patterns [24]. Furthermore, social media has become a

space that expands the function of Bahasa Indonesia as a medium for public communication, while also opening up opportunities for the language to survive through adaptation in digital communication practices [25].

Amidst these dynamics, Bahasa Indonesia continues to serve a vital role as a symbol of national identity and a unifying tool. Efforts to strengthen the use of Bahasa Indonesia on social media are crucial to maintaining the balance between linguistic creativity and the sustainability of the national language [26]. Other research shows that although Generation Z actively uses digital language variations, awareness of the importance of Bahasa Indonesia as a collective identity remains, particularly in formal and academic contexts [27]. Social media can even serve as a strategic tool in maintaining the existence of Bahasa Indonesia by enabling widespread dissemination of language use in various communication contexts [25].

Furthermore, the use of language in digital communication is also related to efforts to preserve the Bahasa Indonesia language amidst globalization. Language serves not only as a means of communication but also as a symbol of cultural and national identity [28]. Therefore, it is important to understand how technology influences the language practices of the younger generation, as well as how Bahasa Indonesia can remain relevant in the digital communication ecosystem [29].

3. METHODS

This research uses a descriptive qualitative approach with the aim of in-depth understanding of the phenomenon of language variation in Generation Z's digital communication and the role of social media in shaping these language practices. This approach was chosen because the research focuses on the meaning, social context, and interpretation of language use in digital

communication spaces, rather than solely on quantitative measurements.

The research data sources come from Generation Z digital communication content published on various social media platforms, such as TikTok, Instagram, and X (Twitter). The research data consists of text uploads, comments, captions, and other forms of digital interactions that demonstrate the use of language variations. Data selection was carried out purposively by considering the following criteria: (1) accounts or users within the Generation Z age range, (2) uploads containing elements of digital language variations, and (3) interactions that demonstrate the social function of language in online communication.

Data collection techniques used non-participatory digital observation and documentation. Researchers observed communication practices that emerged naturally on social media without directly engaging in interactions. Relevant data was then documented in the form of screenshots and text transcriptions to facilitate the analysis process. Additionally, researchers recorded the communication context, including the platform, interaction situation, and user characteristics.

Data analysis was conducted in several stages. First, the data was classified based on the type of language variation, such as the use of slang, code-mixing, abbreviations, or visual symbols. To ensure data validity, the study employed source and context triangulation techniques. Triangulation was achieved by comparing language use across various social media platforms and considering different communication situations. Furthermore, data interpretation was conducted reflectively,

taking into account the social and cultural contexts of users.

Through this method, research is expected to be able to provide a comprehensive picture of the relationship between social media, generational identity, and language variation in digital communication.

The use of code-mixing not only reflects the influence of globalization but also demonstrates an effort to construct a modern and cosmopolitan image in online communication. This linguistic variation demonstrates that language in social media is adaptive to practical and expressive communication needs.

4.2 *Social Media as a Driving Factor for Language Innovation*

Social media has been shown to be a catalyst for the emergence of language innovation among Generation Z. The structure of digital platforms, which allows for widespread and rapid content dissemination, allows new

languages to spread quickly. Certain terms or expressions that are popular in one community can be quickly adopted by other communities through the mechanism of content virality. This demonstrates that social media is not only a means of communication but also a highly effective space for language distribution. In this context, the use of slang in digital content, including in commercial communication strategies on social media, demonstrates that language innovation functions not only as a means of social expression but also as a means of attracting audience attention and building user engagement [30].

The characteristics of social media, which emphasize speed, visuality, and interactivity, also influence the language used. Short phrases, the use of symbols, and simple sentence structures are dominant choices, considered more appropriate for digital communication formats. This phenomenon reinforces the view that communication technology plays a role in shaping users' linguistic practices [8], [6], [31].

Data analysis shows that the language variations used by Generation Z serve not only as a means of communication but also as a representation of social identity. This shift in linguistic norms needs to be understood proportionally, as it does not necessarily indicate a decline in language quality, but rather a change in language function according to the communication context. Therefore, it is important to position digital language variations as part of social practices that have communicative, symbolic, and identity functions [28], [24].

Based on these findings, this study recommends a balanced approach between efforts to maintain the function of Bahasa Indonesia as a national identity and acceptance of linguistic creativity in digital communication. Language education, digital literacy, and language policies need to be directed toward strengthening contextual, rather than merely normative, language awareness. Further research is recommended to examine the relationship between digital

language variation, media literacy, and generational identity change in greater depth using a multidisciplinary approach.

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
